She lives on the traditional territories of the Mississaugas of the Credit, Anishiniabeg, Chippewa, Haudenosaunee and Wendat peoples. Saara’s current community engaged and arts based research focus is on the health and social care needs of women living with HIV and on women and gender diverse pregnant people and parents who consume cannabis. She is particularly interested in illuminating how ideologies of risk and surveillance are enacted in and through legal, health and social care systems, institutions and organizations, and the ways this impacts the health and social care needs and experiences at the intersection of gender, race, class, HIV status, parenthood and age. Fred Ssewamala leads innovative, interdisciplinary research that informs, develops and tests economic empowerment and social protection interventions aimed at improving life chances and long-term developmental impacts for children and adolescent youth impacted by poverty and health disparities in low resource communities. He holds a joint appointment in the Washington University School of Medicine, and directs the International Center for Child Health and Development (ICHAD) and SMART Africa Center.

Currently, Ssewamala is conducting six large-scale, NIH-funded longitudinal randomized control trials across sub-Saharan Africa: Kyaterekera Project, M-Suubi, Suubi+Adherence-R2, Suubi4Her, SMART Africa, and Suubi4Stigma. Another project, Suubi4Cancer, explores care for children living with HIV with suspected cancers. In addition, he is a co-principal investigator on several NIH-funded training programs including the R25 RRT, T37 LEAD, and D43 CHILD-GRF that focus on training early-career researchers committed to careers in child behavioral health.



Dr. Massy Mutumba is an assistant professor in the Department of Health Behavior and Biological Sciences at the University of Michigan School of Nursing. She received her doctorate and master's degrees from the School of Public Health, University of Michigan. Dr. Mutumba's work on HIV focuses primarily on adolescents, with the goal of improving self-management of HIV, adherence to HIV, promotion of sexual reproductive health and wellbeing, measurement and promotion of mental health, including the integration of mental health and HIV care. Dr. Mutumba is a principal investigator on MSuubi- an NIH funded Multi-Level Integrated Intervention to Reduce the Impact of HIV Stigma on HIV Treatment Outcomes among Adolescents Living with HIV in Uganda.
